

Restorative Practices Workshop

The unique feature of this group is that there were all three years of Seneca's CYC program as well as CYC

alumni present. There was also significant international representation in the group.

It created a space for mentoring, sharing and role modelling as well as a safe space for those less inclined to speak. This is the invitational power of circles. Participants engage as their comfort level allows. Over two days the process does its work and brings forth what is the best in each of us!

Seneca has nurtured this opportunity over the years and created an opportunity that is well used by the participants and augurs well for their roles as future CYCP leaders in the field.

Humber College

A spectacular evening of Child and Youth Care research: Humber's BCYC students showcase their thesis projects

What does it mean to do research in the field of Child and Youth Care? What are some of the most pressing issues in the field today? These questions were reflected through the hard work of the 4th year students in Humber's Bachelor of Child and Youth Care program, who showcased their own original research at an event held on April 10th at Humber College-Lakeshore campus. This event, which was attended by faculty, administration, peers, family, and friends of the students, highlighted a wide array of important topics in the field of Child and Youth Care, including practitioner burnout, anti-Black racism, spirituality, bullying, intergenerational conflict, identity formation, social media pressure on young adults, mental health, disabilities and accommodations, human trafficking, LGBTQ++ experiences, and the impacts of COVID-19 on young people.

The students' research projects illustrate the culmination of several research courses covering qualitative design and academic writing, as well as their two thesis courses, through which the students engaged with their own research interests to plan and implement an original qualitative project using their choice of either interviews or content analysis.

As 4th-year student Shanika Bowes indicated when sharing her work on the barriers faced by youth with disabilities, the processes of collecting and analyzing data revealed important learning for "practitioners to better understand needs of young people." This commitment to improving the lives of children and youth was echoed by several other students, who look forward to extending their research through future pursuits like graduate study and the initiation of projects in their professional contexts.







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Accreditation Updates by Wendy Weninger, Accreditation Coordinator



WOW another academic year is almost complete! It is hard to believe that another class of CYC graduates are ready to soar, faculty are finishing up this term and preparing for the next one, many programs are engaging in rich discussions and action plans regarding quality enhancement, and attention is focused on all things linked to CYC post-secondary education. Thank you all for your efforts in striving for excellence in CYC post-

secondary education!

This has been another busy year supporting programs engaged in the accreditation process. Connecting with enthusiastic program faculty is always enjoyable. Seeing faculty model relational practice as they move through the accreditation process, requiring an abundance of reflective practice, is rewarding! Congratulations to programs who have achieved accreditation status, and continued encouragement to those working through the process.

No doubt the CYCEAB accreditation process is time consuming and requires resources outside of one's teaching requirements. We are unique to many other discipline's accreditation processes due to the level of reflection required vs. compiling and summarizing supporting documents. I have received feedback about how rewarding the end goal of receiving accreditation status is, as through the 24 month process, programs were able to identify more clearly their strengths, align goals, promote themselves within their institution, learn about each other at a deeper level, and come together to celebrate success. That is indeed encouraging!

CYCEAB delivered a variety of professional development opportunities this academic year through both webinars and Member Meet-Ups. Thank you to our presenters and hosts! In our promotional "posters", an emphasis has been made to identify the link between the topic and what is required as programs work through various sections of the Self-Study.

It is hoped programs that are accredited, and those looking to become accredited in the future, will use the information from these sessions to assist in delivering high quality CYC post-secondary education. I encourage as many of you as possible attend these sessions as you are able. If anyone has ideas for future sessions – either as a potential presenter or suggested topics/presenters – or wish to learn more about any topic linked to CYC post-secondary education, please share your ideas with CYCEAB at admin@cycaccreditation.ca All ideas to help support programs further are appreciated!

This spring the Board of Directors, in conjunction with the Standards Development and Implementation Committee, will complete its annual review of the accreditation documents (FAQ, Accreditation Process Chart, Application Form, Self-Study Guide and Site Review Guide) with the goal of completing revisions in time for an August 15 posting to the website. Programs looking to a fall 2023 application (September 15 deadline annually) are encouraged to review the documents on the website now, knowing they must follow the versions that will be updated with a 2023 effective date. Feel free to contact me if you have any questions about this.

Programs that may be interested in a fall 2023 application, or even a year or two into the future, are encouraged to connect with myself as the Accreditation Coordinator, at their earliest convenience. I can assist in exploring potential application timelines and answer any questions about readiness and the process. If desired, we can meet virtually with faculty and/ or administration at a convenient time. My key responsibility is to support programs through the process from pre-application to final accreditation decision by the board, so starting the conversation early is definitely beneficial. Thank you to programs that have already initiated this discussion.


